Arthur R. Danielson, 75, of Southington, died Wednesday August 30, 2006 at home. Born in New Britain, son of the late Lincoln and Frieda Glaeser Danielson, he is a New Britain High School graduate and has lived in Southington for the past 35 years. Arthur is a U.S. Army veteran serving his country in Korea. He was employed as a Printer at Lebon Press in Hartford until his retirement in 1994. Arthur was a member of Unity Lodge # 148 AF & AM; was active with Troop 17 of the Boy Scouts in New Britain; and enjoyed boating, camping, traveling, and fishing, especially with his friend Ben.
