January 25, 1920 - January 29, 2005

Dorothy Anne “Dot” Young Simpson, 85, of Spring Lake Village, Southington, died Saturday January 29, 2005 at New Britain General Hospital. Born in Belfast, Northern Ireland, she lived in New Britain for 50 years, moving to Southington in 1978. A graduate of Moody Secretarial School, Dot was Supervisor of Management Services at the Stanley Works for 27 years, retiring in 1985. A longtime member of St. Marks Episcopal Church in New Britain, she was a Corporator of New Britain General Hospital; the New Britain YMCA; and was also active with Friends of the Library. She was a member of the Berlin Garden Club, the formerly active with the Regional Board of the Girl Scouts; Planned Parenthood; and served as a board member of the Stanley Works Credit Union.

Surviving are three daughters, Penny Lee Hayden and her husband Richard of Farmington; Gayle Wright Gregorzek and her husband Joseph of Perico Island, Florida; and Lynne Ann McCoy of Oak Brook, IL; a sister, Bette Lou Herr and her husband John of Osprey, Florida; two grandsons, Adam John Hayden and E. Spencer McCoy; her dear friend of many years, Rollin E. Chisholm of Farmington; several nieces and nephews. She was predeceased by two brothers, J. Rex Young and Horace Young.
