



Frank E. Rogers

January 5, 1923 - October 31, 2008

Frank E. "Bud" Rogers, 85, of Southington, widower of Shirley Krick Rogers, died Friday, October 31, 2008 at the Southington Care Center. Bud was the sixth generation owner of Rogers' Orchards, a Southington family farm that dates back to 1809.

Active in the business from childhood through the present , Bud's love for the land and his incredible work ethic inspired the seventh and eighth generations, now active in the business.

Bud graduated in 1942 from the Loomis School, Windsor, CT and earned his degree in Business Administration from Uconn in 1946. He married his college sweetheart, Shirley Jean Krick, in 1947 and they returned to the farm in 1948. As much as he loved his work, Bud cherished his time with family and friends at their home in Southington, on their boat in Deep River, or at their villa in Longboat Key, Florida. Bud was active in the Connecticut Pomological Society, where he served as President, the Southington Lions' Club, the First Congregational Church, and the Oak Hill Cemetery Association board.

Bud was a devoted husband and a loving and caring father, grandfather and great-grandfather. He was predeceased by his wife Shirley and his sister Carol. He is survived by a daughter Patricia Lumry, and her husband, Rufus, of Bellevue, Washington; a son John Rogers, and his wife Nancy, of

Southington; a sister, Ruth Janet Hague and her husband Dr. John Hague, of DeLand, Florida. He is also survived by seven grandchildren, three great grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

A Memorial Service will be held Wednesday November 5, 2008 2 PM at First Congregational Church of Southington, 37 Main Street, Southington, CT 06489. Burial will be at the convenience of the family in Oak Hill Cemetery, Southington. Calling hours are Tuesday 5 to 8 PM at Carlson Funeral Home, 45 Franklin Square, New Britain.
