Phone calls with her could stretch for hours, she had so much interest in our lives, equal enthusiasm for our major life moments or simply what we were planning to cook that night for dinner. Beyond being a remarkable grandmother, she was a solid, steady friend who reliably brought comfort, joy, and positivity into every conversation.
