Lincoln V. Danielson Sr., 102, formerly of Fairview Street, New Britain, died Thursday May 13, 2004 at Southington Care Center. He was the widower of Frieda Glaeser Danielson, who died in 1995. A lifelong New Britain resident, son of the late Aaron and Hilda Johnson Danielson, he worked at Royal Typewriter Company in Hartford for 37 years, retiring in 1965. He was a member of First Lutheran Church in New Britain, the Unity Lodge, AF&AM formerly Centennial Lodge and was a longtime member of the New Britain YMCA.

Surviving are two sons, Lincoln Danielson and his wife Patricia of Seekonk, Mass; and Arthur Danielson and his wife Beverly of Southington; six grandchildren and their spouses, Hugh and Jill Danielson in Ohio; James and Kelly Danielson in Rhode Island; Aaron Danielson in California; Ellen and John Hacunda in Rhode Island; Jane and James Wivell in Southington; Grace and Paul Bolduc, also in Rhode Island; eight great grandchildren; several nieces and nephews.
