Ma couldn't steer the cart very well, so we bounced off a few shelves She would want to stop at anything just to look at the package, and get some more time out of the house, so we went along with it. Purple noodles.....come on Ma. I could go on for hours, about what an enjoyable person she was to be around. If you knew her you know that. We have a great extended family, who always stands together. Great Aunts and Uncles who were all characters in their own right.
