



Virginia "Ginny" Black

June 29, 1929 - January 19, 2024

Virginia "Ginny" (DeAngelus) Black, 94, of New Britain, wife of the late Irving Black, passed away Friday (January 19, 2024) at Jerome Home in New Britain. Born in Cranston, RI, daughter of the late William and Eva (Geremia) DeAngelus, she lived in New Britain since 1953. Ginny graduated from Cranston High School, Class of 1947 and Rhode Island College in 1951. She taught in Rhode Island briefly, then in New Britain for 3 years and later at McGee Middle School in Berlin for 15 years, retiring in 1992. She was a longtime parishioner of St. Maurice Church in New Britain. She was a former member of the Women's Club of New Britain and volunteered at Jerome Home and New Britain General Hospital for many years.

Ginny leaves her three daughters Carole Black Cohen MD and her husband Roy of Burlington and Westerly, RI, Elizabeth Black and her husband Randall of Boston and Stonington and Kathy Black and her husband John of Kensington. She also leaves four grandchildren, Lindsay, Kate, Matthew and his wife Courtney, and Christopher, and two great grandchildren Cameron and Scarlett; several nieces and nephews. Besides her husband Irv and her parents, Ginny was predeceased by a brother and two sisters.

Funeral services are private. Entombment will be in St. Mary Cemetery Mausoleum. There are no calling hours.
